**HBEL 5386: Germany Travel Study:
Implications of the Holocaust for
Social Work Practitioners
January 4 - 15, 2018**

This travel study course focuses on the complex and profound moral issues surrounding the Holocaust and other structural forms of genocide, oppression, and human rights violations in modern day societies. Aspects of the Holocaust will be highlighted and made relevant to victims of other contemporary mass destructions and oppression. It will provide a fuller understanding of human behavior, social policies, ethics and values within the context of, human oppression, and human rights; all of which are important for social workers working with oppressed populations, bureaucratic systems, social policies, and other political, social, and economic institutions.

The 10-day travel to Germany is a *required* component of the course. Participants will be also be required to attend pre-travel sessions and one post travel session.

Travel Study to Germany

A powerful examination of human behavior through the Holocaust

While in Germany, you will:

- Visit important memorials and museums pertaining to the Holocaust
- Interact with German social work practitioners and gain their perspective on oppression, genocide, and human rights.
- Engage in discussions with social work students and faculty from Hochschule Duesseldorf, our host university
- Establish meaningful and accurate cultural connections to the people and cities visited

Travel Study course costs:

The approximate per person cost is \$2,200 and includes round-trip airfare; lodging and some meals; ground transportation in Germany, entrance fees and tours. Participants should plan for some additional costs to include social activities, food and transportation as desired. The cost of the 3 credit course is \$2,418, plus associated fees. Financial aid and travel subsidies may be available.

Students should also plan to be available April 5-16, 2018 when the UConn School of Social Work will be hosting the German students.
